

Dear Ms. Obermeyer:


I have received your letter dated September 23, and a copy of your letter to the Justice Department.

I have no information to assist you. I have utterly no recollection concerning the Stevens matter, which was considered by the Alaska Supreme Court many years before I worked there. In the spring of 1980, while I was clerk, several thousand closed files in the clerk's office were microfilmed. Looking at the material which the clerk's office sent you recently, I would surmise that file number 64 must have been missing from the boxes of paper files that were being microfilmed, and a substitute file was made up consisting of all that could be located elsewhere in the office: a copy of the docket sheet and a copy of the opinion as it appeared in the Pacific Reporter. I emphasize again that this is a guess based on looking at the papers you sent me. I have no first-hand recollection of any of this, not even after reviewing what you sent.

(Parenthetically, I didn't grow up in Juneau. I only lived there for two years as an adult.)

This is the best I can do for you.
